




What is Ubuntunet Alliance?

 The regional Research and Education Network of ESA region

- NRENs from 15 countries
 - Eb@le, DRC
 - EthERNet, Ethiopia
 - iRENALA, Madagascar
 - KENET, Kenya
 - MAREN, Malawi
 - MoRENet, Mozambique
 - XNet, Namibia
 - RwEdNet, Rwanda
 - SomaliREN, Somalia
 - SudREN, Sudan
 - TENET, South Africa
 - TERNET, Tanzania
 - RENU, Uganda
 - ZAMREN, Zambia
 - BERNET, Burundi







Where are we now? - Current network

- 10 POPs in total
 - 8 in ESA region
 - 2 in Europe (London and Amsterdam)
- Backbone covering 7 countries in ESA region
- 2.18Gbps capacity between the and European PoPs
 - 2 links along the west coast
 - 2 links on the eastern coast
- We also have some NRENs connecting directly to our European PoPs
 - KENET(Kenya) 2x STM-4, 1xSTM-1, 1xSTM-16 (approx. 3.9 Gbps)
 - TENET(South Africa) 2 x 10Gbps
 - MoRENet (Mozambique) 1xSTM-1
 - TERNET (Tanzania) 1xSMT-1






Where are we now? Current network

- 6 NRENs connected to PoPs in Africa
 - RENU (Uganda), connected to Kampala PoP
 - KENET (Kenya), connected to Nairobi PoP
 - ZAMREN(Zambia), connected through Lusaka PoP
 - MoRENet (Mozambique), connected through Maputo PoP
 - TENET(South Africa), connected through Mtunzini and Cape Town PoPs
 - RwEdNet (Rwanda) connected through the Kigali PoP
- Peering with GÉANT in London and Amsterdam
 - Research and Education traffic from GÉANT and other RRENs that peer with GÉANT
- Peering at LINX and AMS-IX (Settlement free)
- Peering at NAPAfrica (Settlement free)
- Transit at LINX and AMS-IX

Where are we now? - training

- Regular capacity building events since 2012
- In partnership with AfricaConnect, NSRC and INASP
 - To train Network Engineers at campus and NREN level
 - In a sustainable way
- Mode:
 - Training workshops
 - Mostly at NREN level, by NRENs training personnel from member institutions
 - Training of Trainers, carried out once every year.
 - Secondment of expert personnel from advanced NRENs and similar organizations to assist with specific phases of network development
 - mainly direct engineering assistance events, including equipment

Where are we now? - training

AfricaConnect & INASP

- Funding of training workshops organized by the Alliance in collaboration with NSRC
- Funding personnel to attend courses at AfNOG
- NSRC
 - Provide trainers for workshop events (NREN and campus level)
 - Train trainers
 - Provide training kits
 - Support for trainees and trainers to attend training events
 - Direct Engineering Assistance for Universities including equipment donations



Where are we now? - training

- 79 personnel directly trained since November 2012
 - 33 on advanced routing techniques
 - 15 on various courses offered by AfNOG
 - Scalable Internet Services, Scalable Network Infrastructure, Network Monitoring & Management, Advanced Routing and CERT
 - 31 trained as trainers at ToT workshops held in Kigali in 2013 and Lusaka in 2014
 - Trainers have organized 22 training workshops in their respective NRENs, training a total of 515 technical personnel
 - More events planned to take place before the end of 2015
- So far, 8 Direct Engineering Assistance events have bee carried out with equipment donations in some cases.
 - To improve campus networks





How did we get to where we are now?

- Through efforts of member NRENs which leased links to the 2 PoPs in Amsterdam and London
- Through donations of organizations and member NRENs
 - Cisco, for the original router at the London PoP
 - IDRC, for aiding the secretariat
 - NSRC, AfricaConnect and INASP for supporting the capacity building program
 - AfricaConnect, for funding the establishment of UbuntuNet
 - Alliance member NRENs for funding the establishment of UbuntuNet

- Was a project to Implement UbuntuNet (the network)
 - Interconnect NREN networks within the Alliance region
 - Ensure African traffic is exchanged within Africa
 - Connect to GÉANT and rest of REN community through UbuntuNet PoPs in Europe
- Budget € 14.75 M for 4 years, ending May 5th 2015.
 - 80% provided by EC
 - 20% by Alliance NRENs
- It aimed to;
 - Foster the development of cooperative research programmes between European and African research and education communities;
 - Open up the research activities in the region and build co-operation with researchers in the rest of the world;
 - Support NREN staff capacity building
- Was successful, as seen from the foregoing discussion





Where do we go from here? - AfricaConnect2

- AfricaConnect2 builds on the work carried out under the previous AfricaConnect action and extends it to a pan-African scope.
 - Cluster1 ESA, under Ubuntunet Alliance
 - Cluster 2 West and Central Africa region, under WACREN
 - Cluster 3 North African countries organised under ASREN
- Cluster 1 budget €10M, over a 4 year period
 - 75% provided by EC
 - 25% by Alliance NRENs
- The Alliance will use the funding to consolidate and improve the UbuntuNet - upgrading extant links, building resilience, connecting newly ready NRENs and implementing einfrastructure services.
